# **Conversation Analysis: Unit 8**

### Overview

Here is a handout that will help your students review key points from Unit 8. It can be done in class as an expansion activity, as a short quiz, or as a homework assignment.

In this task, students must analyze the Listening Practice dialog on page 117 by answering questions about it. By doing so, students will review the following:

- Open vs. closed questions
- Conversation strategies: Reacting, Getting Time to Think
- Implicit questions (Golden Rule 2)
- Talking about yourself (Golden Rule 3)

The final page contains the answers you'll need to check the student papers. Alternatively, you could provide a photocopy of the answer page and have students check their own work.
