Ask for more details

When you ask your partner about where they are from or where they live, and you get a short, vague answer in reply, demonstrate your interest in communicating by asking a simple follow-up question to draw out more details: "Whereabouts (in Tokyo)?"

For example:

Whereabouts?

Whereabouts in Tokyo?

- In Shinjuku / the center / the suburbs.
- Near Tokyo Station.

Similarly, if you haven't heard of a place your partner mentions, it's good to follow up by asking, "Where's that?"

For example:

Where's that?

- It's in Mie prefecture / Shikoku.
- It's near Sendai / the Japan sea.

If you don't know how to say something, ask!

When talking about majors and faculties, there will probably be times when you won't know how to say something in English. In that case, rather than remaining stuck in silence, just ask! Use this expression: "How do you say " \cor " in English?" If your partner doesn't know, then ask your teacher. Remember that in English, it's vital to avoid silences of more than a few seconds.

Give yourself time to think

After someone asks you a question, it's quite common to need a few moments to think about your answer, even if the question itself is easy to understand. To sound more natural in English, try these common English thinking sounds and expressions.



Answering the implicit "why?"

A key to sounding more communicative in English is to give longer answers by answering an implicit question or two. When talking about hardest and easiest days, "why?" is the main implicit question. To sound more natural, simply provide a reason about why your day is especially hard or easy. Let's take a look at the following Model Sentences for some easy language patterns you can use to answer the implicit "why."

The difference between "hobby" and "free time activity"

In English, there is a clear distinction between a "hobby" and "free time activity." The former is something you actively choose to do for your pleasure. It also involves an aspect of creativity or self-development. Passive activities, such as sleeping or listening to music, are not considered hobbies.

単語の使い分け:「hobby (趣味)」と 「free time activity (余暇にすること)」の違い

英語では、「hobby (趣味)」と「free time activity (余暇にすること)」の間に明確な違いがあるので注意しましょう。前者は、自分が楽しむためにすすんで行うもので、多かれ少なかれ上達するための創造的・自発的な活動を伴うものです。寝ることや音楽を聴くことなどの受動的な活動は、「hobby (趣味)」にはなりません。



Use "echo questions" to give yourself time to think


When talking about favorite movies or actors, you will likely need time to think of your answers. "Echo questions" are an effective strategy in that case. Just repeat part of the question with a rising intonation. This will buy you some time to come up with your reply. For example:






